**26% of persons<sup>4</sup>** in an acute or non-acute setting have a pressure injury

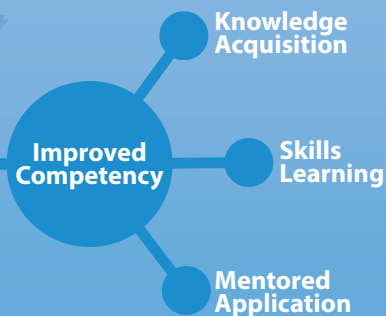
Preventing and treating wounds must be a **priority** within health care.
